

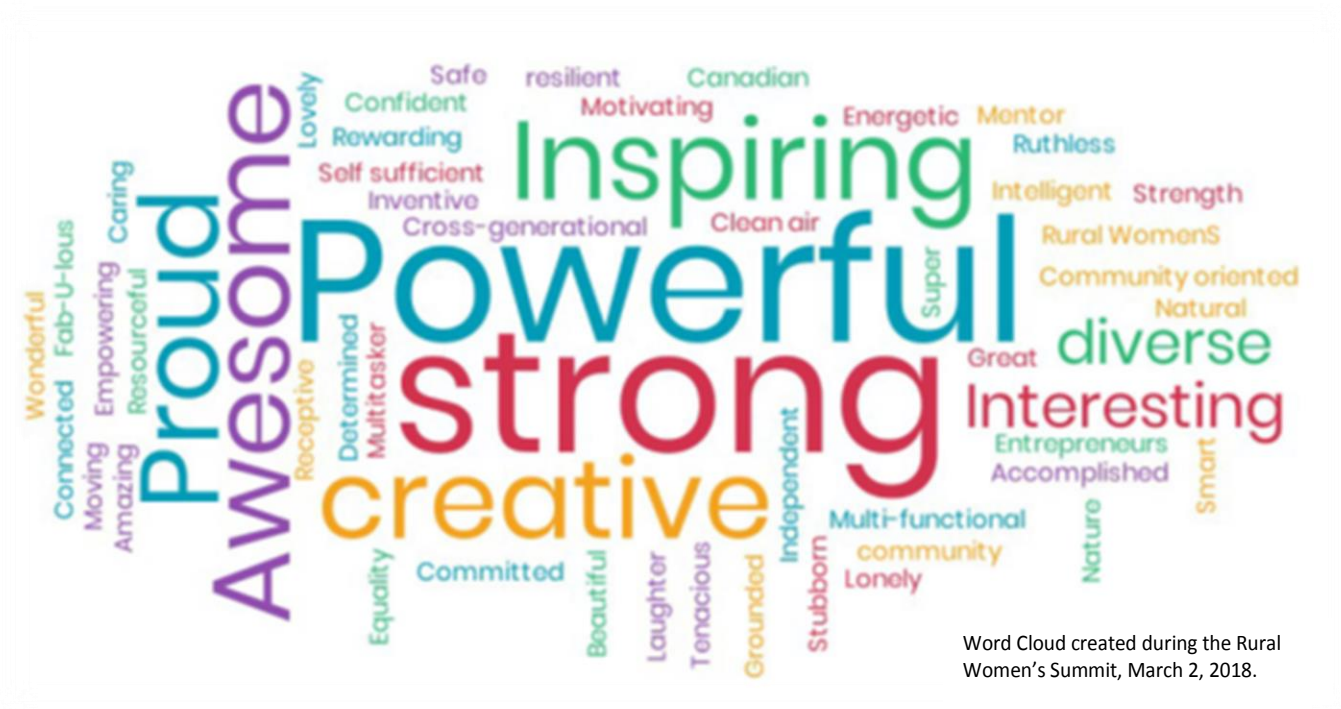

Greetings,

I am pleased to present this report on the first annual Rural Women's Summit which was held in Buckhorn, Ontario on March 2, 2018. I was grateful to see a group of nearly 100 women and men from rural communities throughout Peterborough—Kawartha and neighbouring ridings, along with urban dwellers interested in the issues. These individuals shared their experiences and challenges, and provided recommendations on priorities the federal government, and indeed all orders of government, should consider to empower rural women and girls, and to build equality across genders and regions.

The Summit was launched by an expert panel who described their experiences as rural women. I was particularly moved by the honest and deeply felt comments shared by the panelists and the participants over the course of the afternoon, and by the open and respectful interactions among those in attendance. It was wonderful to see conversations across generations to mutual benefit. I was also impressed with musicians Mary and Martha Colton, who performed beautifully during the break along with the talented Melissa Payne.

At the end of the day, I came away with a better understanding of rural life for women and girls, and the distinct needs of indigenous women. I felt well equipped to bring these experiences to the United Nations Commission of the Status of Women on the Empowerment of Rural Women and Girls. I was reminded of the importance of highlighting the impact of women in rural communities who are role models for us all. So it was also an opportune time to launch our Women of Peterborough-Kawartha Community Service Award nominations, with award winners to be celebrated during Women's History Month in October.

Participants offered insights and concrete recommendations that are detailed in the pages that follow. A very special thank you to the Organizing Committee, the Buckhorn Community Centre, and to everyone who attended. This conversation will go on to inform my work as MP for Peterborough-Kawartha and as Minister of the Status of Women.

Summit Goals

On Friday March 2, 2018 MP Maryam Monsef held her first Rural Women's Summit from 2pm to 7pm at the Buckhorn Community Centre. The Summit was held the week before MP Monsef led the Canadian delegation to the UN in her capacity as Minister of the Status of Women, and it also offered an opportunity to mark International Women's Day.

Goals:

- To share experiences of rural women and girls in Peterborough—Kawartha
- To identify some of the challenges, and also the opportunities, that exist in terms of gender equality and empowerment of rural women and girls
- To identify action steps for Peterborough—Kawartha
- To offer ideas, suggestions and recommendations based on participants' experience that will inform Maryam's work in Ottawa, and at the upcoming UN Commission on the Status of Women Conference on Rural Women and Girls.

Summary – Key Action Steps & Priorities

The overarching recommendation from the Summit participants was that all levels of government need to work together to address the needs of rural residents and communities.

The priorities for action in Peterborough—Kawartha that had broad support by the participants were:

- Better Rural Public Transit Infrastructure, such as regular bus transportation, to connect residents to services and communities across the riding;
- Community Hubs – offering a range of services closer to home, including training & education, health care, counselling, that also enable a certain level of confidentiality for those accessing services;
- Youth Mentorship Programs that connect younger women with more experienced women particularly in the area of entrepreneurship;
- More opportunities for women to convene, through annual events or organizations such as the Women's Institute.

Other notable recommendations from the small group discussions included:

- Ensuring widespread and affordable broadband access for business, personal and safety purposes;
- Supporting and funding opportunities in sustainable employment and rural enterprise;
- Maintaining rural schools for children.

Overview of the Planning Process

The Summit was organized with the assistance of a planning team of 11 rural women who are based in different communities in the riding: Janet Clarkson, Ellen Dumas, Beryl Harris, Karen Jopling, Kassie Graham, Barb Jinkerson, Clara Leahy, Lorri Rork, Stephanie Bolton, Carolyn Amyotte, Amanda Gray; with additional input from MPP Jeff Leal and his staff.

With the framework and guidance of MP Monsef and her staff, the volunteers decided on the format of the day, recommended panelists, assisted with promotion and publicity, and were responsible for the logistics on the day of the event. This group was key to the success of the event.

The Summit was planned to achieve the goals through several interconnected approaches:

- 1) The event was divided into two sessions – afternoon and evening – to offer flexibility for individuals to participate. Each session was designed to include both information through presentations, and opportunities for participant engagement.
- 2) It was important to offer a childcare option to enable more women to participate. The Organizing Team reached out to *Compass Early Learning and Care* who generously offered staff and resources, and the *Fleming College Early Childhood Education Program* promoted the opportunity to student volunteers, so that on-site childcare could be available during the afternoon session.
- 3) A panel of rural women with diverse backgrounds: Deborah Jacobs (Councillor, Curve Lake First Nation); Clara Leahy (Student, Douro-Dummer), Courtney Mader (XR Farms, Lakehurst), Lorri Rork (Coordinator, Community Care), Mary Smith (Mayor, Selwyn Township) presented a range of experiences and ideas to initiate participant discussion.
- 4) MP Maryam Monsef moderated the discussion. She was able to reflect on the federal government initiatives and discussions that were relevant to the panelists' comments.
- 5) Participants had the opportunity to share their own experiences and delve deeper into the issues through a series of three questions which guided the small group discussion towards concrete actions. Panelists and members of the Organizing Committee joined these discussion groups.
- 6) Information and Resource tables with materials were accessible throughout the day (see Appendix for participating organizations). The representatives and information provided an additional opportunity for participants to gain practical information of services and activities available to rural women and girls.
- 7) MP Monsef delivered a keynote address in her roles as both MP and Minister of the Status of Women. Her interactive presentation further informed the participants of the federal government's activities and offered opportunities to learn more about her work as a Cabinet Minister and representative of the people of Peterborough—Kawartha.

During the afternoon session, on-site childcare was available through Compass Early Learning & Care (Jill Wickins, Samantha Monteith-Damario, Kelly Saltern) and Fleming College Early Childhood Education student volunteers (Cheryl Herder, Program Coordinator).

A total of 82 participants attended from North Kawartha, Selwyn, Trent Lakes, Curve Lake, City of Peterborough and Havelock-Belmont-Methuen. There were also a few participants from the neighbouring ridings of Hastings-Lennox & Addington, Haliburton-Kawartha Lakes-Brock, and Northumberland-Peterborough South.

Round Table Discussions

Responses gathered from participants are grouped by theme and selected suggestions are available below. Please refer to Appendix for all comments.

Question 1:

What Does Equality and Empowerment of Women and Girls Mean to Me?

- 1) **Confidence & Strength among women:** listening to unique voices of women; nurturing women's confidence to go into politics; women speaking up and being heard with respect; embracing the strengths of women rather than women taking on "masculine" traits; having choices.
- 2) **Succeeding within the culture of a male-dominated workplace:** women excelling in non-traditional roles and careers; women leading in business; women sitting on Boards of Directors and not as a token woman; mentoring women to step into non-traditional careers; opportunities for more women in trades (safe places for women to work); valuing women's jobs/roles.
- 3) **Access to services & opportunities:** equal opportunity in arts, culture, jobs, sports; education that breaks the isolation; programs for re-entry in the workforce or maintaining skills in the workplace; more education and economic opportunities with equal pay for work of equal value.
- 4) **Importance of Family and Supporting the Next Generation:** universal childcare (more choice and recognition of different child care choices); supporting the whole family; supporting men to support in the home; mentors for young people; creating a bright future for our children and grandchildren.

Question 2:

If We Could Change One Thing In Peterborough—Kawartha To Make Things Better For Rural Women And Girls, What Would That Be?

- 1) **Improve transportation options to access services, address isolation.** The participants noted that there is a significant need for accessible, safe, predictable transportation options from rural and remote communities and locations. For seniors, youth, women, those living with disabilities, or simply those who do not have cars or do not drive, there must be options to travel from one location to another safely and predictably. There are pilot projects in rural bussing in nearby ridings and even within this riding that could be evaluated and further extended to incorporate a broader range of communities.
- 2) **Bring opportunities to rural areas – education, jobs, healthcare, recreation, accessible housing – “Place-Based Community Design and funding”.** Participants want to be able to enjoy a good quality of life in a rural community, therefore planning for the future needs to ensure that services are available “in place”, in the communities where people live, work or go to school. Travel time should be minimized and accessibility to services maximized, so that, for example, a 30 minute doctor’s appointment does not require 2 hours of driving; or children don’t need to be bussed for several hours each day to go to school. Participants also noted that these opportunities need to be sustainable, such as permanent rather than seasonal jobs, medical practitioners who decide to stay in the community, and so on.
- 3) **Increase opportunities for networking, gathering together as women and girls.** The participants at the Summit had overwhelmingly positive feedback on the event as a much-needed forum to gather together and share experiences and ideas. There was a particular interest in the Women’s Institute model as an option that could address the interests and needs of women to come together, and work collaboratively on practical projects or on civic engagement and advocacy. Whether through discrete events or ongoing meetings and gatherings, the participants expressed the importance of combatting social isolation through face-to-face interactions, and building relationships across rural communities and between urban and rural residents.
- 4) **Offer mentoring to younger women and girls – especially around entrepreneurship.** Participants were pleased that the Summit included women of all ages, and they noted that these efforts could be future enhanced by reaching out specifically to younger women to become more actively involved. There was also interest in seeing more women entrepreneurs participating in these gatherings. Entrepreneurship was highlighted as a key area where mentorship of young women and girls could create new opportunities for women to be successful and address the concerns of succession and sustainability of rural communities.

Question 3:

What Concrete Steps Can We Take To Move Towards Goals From Question 2?

With all levels of government working together to address the needs of rural residents and communities:

- Establish or improve Rural Public Transit Infrastructure, such as regular bus transportation, to connect residents to services and communities across the riding;
- Create or further develop Community Hubs – offering a range of services closer to home, including training & education, health care, counselling, that also enable a certain level of confidentiality for those accessing services;
- Initiate Youth Mentorship Programs, matching younger women with more experienced women in areas such as entrepreneurship;
- Offer more opportunities to network among women, through special events and organizations such as the Women’s Institute.

Other notable recommendations included:

- Ensure widespread and affordable broadband access for business, personal and safety purposes;
- Support and fund opportunities in sustainable employment and rural enterprise;
- Maintain rural schools for children in communities across the riding.

Next Steps

The Rural Women's Summit had two key purposes: (1) to offer insights to MP Monsef that would inform her in her roles as MP for the riding of Peterborough-Kawartha and Minister of the Status of Women; and (2) to identify action steps towards empowering rural women and girls in Peterborough-Kawartha.

During the week of March 12 to 16, **MP Monsef will lead the Canadian delegation** to the UN Commission on the Status of Women Conference in New York. The experiences, challenges and priorities expressed by the Summit participants will be integrated into her discussions and presentations during the conference which focused on Empowering Rural Women and Girls.

Within the Riding of Peterborough—Kawartha, **the Summit Report will be emailed to all participants** as well as municipal and provincial government representatives in an effort to move forward on the action priorities.

The 2018 Federal Budget was the first gender-based budget tabled at the Federal level two days before the Rural Women's Summit, and several key directions dovetail closely with the recommendations of the Summit participants, namely:

- The establishment of the Apprentice Incentive Grant for Women, a pilot project offering 2-year, \$6,000 grants to women pursuing training in male-dominated Red Seal trades;
- Doubling the number of job placements funded under the Canada Summer Jobs Program and investments in the Youth Employment Strategy;
- \$500 million to help develop the next generation of rural broadband through the Strategic Innovation Fund. Reliable access to the internet is an essential tool to drive economic growth and greater safety in our rural communities;
- The new Women Entrepreneurship Strategy backed by over \$1.65 billion in new financing for women-led businesses through the Business Development Bank of Canada and Export Development Canada, and \$105 million in tailored support and mentorship for female entrepreneurs;
- Doubling funding to a \$200 million investment in women's organizations across Canada to support more projects that advance gender equality, address gender-based violence, engage youth and men and boys in solutions, address online child exploitation and teen dating violence, and assessing the remaining "unfounded" cases of sexual assault;
- Addressing the gender wage gap through legislation requiring equal pay for work of equal value in federally-regulated sectors; and
- A \$920 million renewal of base funding for Fed Dev Ontario, plus an additional \$149 million to the agency for Innovation and Skills Plan programming.

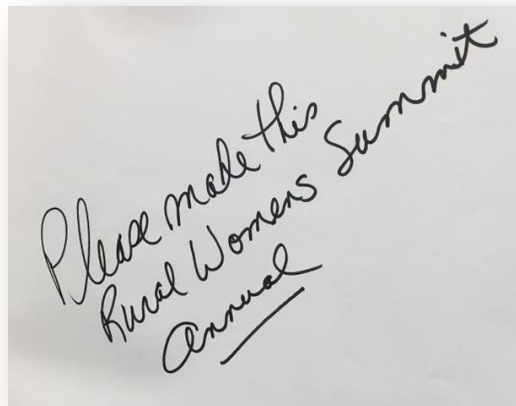
MP Monsef and her team will take the information gleaned from the Summit and **follow up with local stakeholders** and interested constituents to continue to advocate on behalf of rural women and girls in Peterborough—Kawartha. As a first step, a meeting will be convened to **work on improving transportation** avenues for rural communities in the riding.

Participant Feedback and Evaluation

Small Group Discussion Notes

Nine groups gathered at round tables to discuss three guiding questions. Each group recorded their discussions and then reported back on key ideas focused primarily on Question 2 and 3. The following are the written notes gathered from each group.

GROUP 1

WHAT DOES WOMEN'S EQUALITY AND EMPOWERMENT OF WOMEN AND GIRLS MEAN TO ME?

- Focus on themselves, giving to them
- Self-care – burnout (need to prove yourself)
- Opportunity to be with family & work (balance – mom guilt)
- Stronger than we think
- Confidence & strength – goal
- To sit on a board and not be a token woman
- You're there because you deserve to be there
- Male-dominated career – how do we mentor women to step in; have men step into female dominated role
- Careers “labeled women” – PSW etc. historically these roles make less money
- Undervaluing the ‘stay at home’ mom
- Having youth taught finances in school – understand value

IF WE COULD CHANGE ONE THING IN PETERBOROUGH—KAWARTHA TO MAKE THINGS BETTER FOR RURAL WOMEN AND GIRLS, WHAT WOULD THAT BE?

1. Stop closing rural schools
2. Incentives for young families to move to rural communities
3. Better Community Design & Planning – school, bank, natural gas, broadband**
4. Keep rural schools open; banking/post office – innovative use of existing facilities, library; broadband, public Wi-Fi, municipality; natural gas – residential, agricultural, industry reduces cost
5. Transportation – access to support – need to be more innovative**
6. Accessibility for young and old; innovative partnerships (Community Care/Hamilton Bus lines); efficient/sustainable (driver's license for seniors like for youth)
7. Leveraging technology
8. Other: place-based economic development

WHAT CONCRETE STEPS CAN WE TAKE TO MOVE TOWARDS GOALS FROM QUESTION B?

- Place-Based Economic Development:
- Engage all levels of government with common vision
- Unified voice
- Community buy-in
- Place-based funding model eg. OFA

- Private-Public partnerships – more collaboration
- Engage all demographics

GROUP 2

WHAT DOES WOMEN’S EQUALITY AND EMPOWERMENT OF WOMEN AND GIRLS MEAN TO ME?

- Mentors
- Women speak up – mutual respect
- Women to graduate and be treated equally – not feel they are channeled into a teacher or nurse etc.
- Non-traditional jobs
- Women – ‘inheritance’ – women taking over the business
- Education – breaking the isolation

IF WE COULD CHANGE ONE THING IN PETERBOROUGH—KAWARTHA TO MAKE THINGS BETTER FOR RURAL WOMEN AND GIRLS, WHAT WOULD THAT BE?

- Transportation
- Bring opportunities to rural areas – recreation, healthcare, jobs/training
- Further support of initiatives

WHAT CONCRETE STEPS CAN WE TAKE TO MOVE TOWARDS GOALS FROM QUESTION B?

- 1) Transportation – City dedicate buses to rural area; municipally owned transportation; business sponsored.
- 2) Bring opportunities to rural areas – rural businesses/farms – mentor young people; buses go into city, also come out with people

GROUP 3

WHAT DOES WOMEN’S EQUALITY AND EMPOWERMENT OF WOMEN AND GIRLS MEAN TO ME?

- Women’s work in traditionally male occupations is equally valued
- Traditionally women’s roles valued equally as men’s roles
- Equal pay for equal work
- Being heard with respect
- Embracing the strengths of being a woman rather than taking on masculine traits
- Issue of consent is taken seriously and expanded upon
- More choice and recognition for different child care choices
- Programs for work re-entry or maintaining skills

IF WE COULD CHANGE ONE THING IN PETERBOROUGH—KAWARTHA TO MAKE THINGS BETTER FOR RURAL WOMEN AND GIRLS, WHAT WOULD THAT BE?

- Networking opportunities, especially with transportation issues
- RE-instatement of women’s institutes

WHAT CONCRETE STEPS CAN WE TAKE TO MOVE TOWARDS GOALS FROM QUESTION B?

- Re-invigorate the Women's Institute. Support by women and for women in communities
- Programs for work re-entry and maintaining skills after childbirth
- Consent education in schools. Consent as a way of life starting from very young. Hugs, etc.
- Programs for work re-entry for parents who have chosen to stay home with kids – more choices, fewer hurdles
- Funding to support rural entrepreneurs – including farmers – and the organizations that support them eg. Farms at Work (includes mentoring of young farmers)

GROUP 4

WHAT DOES WOMEN'S EQUALITY AND EMPOWERMENT OF WOMEN AND GIRLS MEAN TO ME?

- Opportunity – jobs, sports, etc.
- Systemic barriers in workplace – seen as equal not just treated as equal
- Communication barrier between generations

IF WE COULD CHANGE ONE THING IN PETERBOROUGH—KAWARTHA TO MAKE THINGS BETTER FOR RURAL WOMEN AND GIRLS, WHAT WOULD THAT BE?

- More economic and education opportunities
- Confidential access to services including transportation, internet and health and social services, including a hub or outreach
- Safe transportation to and from urban centres
- Safe houses
- Health outreach (mental and physical) – access and outreach; predictable and consistent; non-judgmental; confidential
- Accessible housing
- More economic and education opportunities with equal pay
- More social service programs

WHAT CONCRETE STEPS CAN WE TAKE TO MOVE TOWARDS GOALS FROM QUESTION B?

- Municipalities/wards need to encourage investment in industry/infrastructure to promote business – tax breaks? Education and training incentives, local investment, providing infrastructure to support
- Housing – supportive, affordable, accessible, safe

GROUP 5

WHAT DOES WOMEN'S EQUALITY AND EMPOWERMENT OF WOMEN AND GIRLS MEAN TO ME?

- Equal pay for same thing a guy does
- Greater diversity of ideas and ultimately greater selections
- Equality in sports programs
- Equal education

- Encouragement of parents – whatever you want to be you will have to do it yourself
- Driver’s license is important, and then car!!

IF WE COULD CHANGE ONE THING IN PETERBOROUGH—KAWARTHA TO MAKE THINGS BETTER FOR RURAL WOMEN AND GIRLS, WHAT WOULD THAT BE?

- Employment – job opportunities to keep people living here
- Transportation to whatever opportunities available
- People need to be made aware of the advantages and disadvantages of living in the country
- Communication with groups of people that are active in the community
- Radio station
- Recreational facilities – splash pad, movie theatre, bank machine

WHAT CONCRETE STEPS CAN WE TAKE TO MOVE TOWARDS GOALS FROM QUESTION B?

- Junior achievement idea in high schools to encourage small business entrepreneurs
- Organize a new resident information sessions
